VICTORY!! Together We Did It!....but we need to stay diligent and not let our guard down!

Outstanding effort on behalf of our APAS members and community as Issue 2 — more commonly known as SB5 – was defeated at the polls in Ohio. A special thanks to all of our APAS members who worked diligently over these past several months through our grassroots organizing, coalition building and community outreach. Because of these efforts, 1,298,301 signatures were delivered to place SB5 on the ballot. This was the most signatures ever collected for a ballot issue. And, this was the first time in American history that collective bargaining has been on the ballot! Here are some interesting facts from the petition drive, OEA member participation and Issue 2 election results. This information was provided by Melissa

Clark, OEA governmental services, from the NEOEA Negotiations Conference held Saturday, November 19.

Petition Drive: Qualified in every county; 700 OEA members circulated petitions; 8,600 petition books collected; 48,000 member signatures; 180,000 total signatures.

OEA Member Participation: Over 30,000 members did some activity for Issue 2/Senate Bill 5; during the last four days of GOTV, OEA members knocked on over 90,000 doors, completed 1,800 canvass shifts and 600 phone banks. OEA members and staff accounted for 25% of all volunteers.

Issue 2 Election Results: Voter turnout was 91% of what turnout was in 2010, nearly matching a Gubernatorial/ US Senate election year; 12 counties saw more voters in 2011 over 2010; 82 of 88 counties voted "NO" on Issue 2. "Yes" counties were: Warren, Miami, Shelby, Mercer, Delaware and Holmes. "No" vote prevailed in 53 of 59 counties that Kasich won in 2010 (90%); 55 counties had more votes against Issue 2 in 2011 than votes for Kasich in 2010. Election Results: 61.33% (2,145,043) voted NO, 38.67% (1.352,366) voted YES, total votes 3,497,409. Mahoning (72%) and Trumbull (71%) had the HIGHEST NO VOTES of all the **NEOEA** counties!
