


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Greetings APAS:

It has been a strange seven months for YSU. Recap: In the fall, APAS avoided a potential layoff and the university administration agreed, in an unprecedented move, to create a joint task force with the presidents of all four bargaining units that will address the financial status of the university.

Just since January, the university's chief financial officer Glonek resigns to take a position elsewhere; Provost Ikram Khawaja announces plans to retire in June; President Randy Dunn announces his resignation after only seven months as president; and Dr. Khawaja agrees to serve as interim president until his retirement. No encores, thank you!

Use It or Lose It:

Let Contract Benefit Pay for Training

Is there a career-related class you'd like to take? A professional conference you want to attend? Why not use the Professional Development funds you're entitled to under our current YSU-APAS bargaining agreement?

So far, just over one-third of the membership, have taken advantage of the new Professional Development fund. Negotiated as part of our current, three-year contract, it pays up to \$500 per year per member for work-related courses, conferences and other career training. Some have managed to use their allotted funds for two or three training opportunities in the first two years of the bargaining agreement.

In all, members have used \$21,754 in training dollars – just a fraction of the \$225,000 the university will make available throughout the union's three-year agreement. Michael Glonek, YSU-APAS president, is concerned that those relatively low participation

Grants to Fund Gardens, Books for Kids

Susanne Miller, an APAS member and senior academic adviser in the Bitonte College of Health and Human Services, applied for and was awarded two \$250 PR Mini Grants by the Northeast Ohio Education Association.

The first grant will purchase seeds, plants, fertilizer and gardening equipment for the Boys and Girls Club's "How Does Your Garden Grow" project. It's a program that encourages healthy eating and teaches children the fundamentals

of vegetable gardening. Funds from the second grant will buy reading materials and educational software for the club's Reading Corner.

"The Boys and Girls Club is such a wonderful organization. They do good work with kids," Miller said.

"I like it, too, because we represent higher education, and these are both educational projects."



Scholarship Endowment Passes Half-Way Mark

It's growing! The APAS Scholarship Endowment at YSU balance had reached \$5,109 by mid-March, edging past the half-way mark. The goal is to reach \$10,000 by 2018.

Jacci Daniel Johnson, YSU's annual giving coordinator, reports that 53 members, or 32 percent, have contributed so far to the endowment fund, which was established as part of the union's "APAS Gives Back" initiative. One member contributed a \$525 leadership gift, many others made pledges and one-time gifts, the union kicked in \$1,000 and raffles at APAS membership meetings have raised more than \$350.

Once the endowment goal is reached, an APAS Scholarship will be awarded annually to a YSU student who qualifies under scholarship criteria established by the committee. levels could jeopardize the union's staff development benefit during the next round of contract talks. "This is a valuable benefit," he said. "If we don't use it, we could lose it."

Four APAS members – Susan Moorer, Mary Jane Quaranta, Maureen Reardon and Mary Lou Weingart – have been appointed to a new committee focused on increasing members' use of the Professional Development funds. Reardon said the committee will help members who have questions or problems accessing the benefit or completing the paperwork. The group is also creating a database of available training options for members, including online courses and training CDs and DVDs to purchase.

Some members have discovered ingenious ways to use the funds.

For example, Sally Kenney, a senior academic advisor in the Bitonte College of Health and Human Services, used her Professional Development allocation to pay the speaker fee for a February workshop on serving college students diagnosed with autism spectrum disorders. In this way, Kenney used the funds to benefit herself and close 50 other YSU faculty and staff who attended the event. The seminar was also funded by Centofanti Center of Health and Welfare for Vulnerable Populations.

Rick Schilling: From Theater to Event Design Schilling Spent 32

For some folks, retirement is a time to dig out the fishing pole, activate long-awaited travel plans and settle down for some good reading.

Not so for Rick Schilling. Retired recently as associate staff designer for YSU's Department of Theater and Dance, he transitioned immediately into a new, full-time position as event designer for Something New Florist in Canfield.

"Something New is one of the only businesses in this part of the country that has production facilities in-house," Schilling said, describing the array of props, costumes and decorative items he uses to create beautiful and unique settings for special events. He sets the stage for corporate events, weddings and other family celebrations, often working his design magic outside the area in cities such as Detroit, Cleveland and Pittsburgh.

Schilling spent 32 years in YSU's theater department, many of them as assistant to associate professor Jane Shanabarger.

During that time he directed 25 stage productions, designed the scenery and costumes for 75 and assisted Shanabarger with 150 more. "We had a great long run working together, and it was very exciting," he said, "I was a part of bringing the Theater and Dance program to accreditation and moving into new spaces at Bliss Hall. There was a lot of growth."

After earning a BFA in studio art from YSU in 1980, Schilling earned an MS in speech communications from Southern Illinois University at Carbondale and an MFA in costume design, a terminal degree, from Kent State. A resident of Poland, he retired from his YSU position in July.
