# Got a Cause? APAS Grants Available

If there's a philanthropic cause that's tugging on your heart strings, YSU-APAS might be able to lend a hand.

The recently formed Campus & Community Relations Committee is now coordinating the process of requesting and granting gifts on behalf of APAS. The

committee can award up to \$500 annually, in increments of up to \$125 each, for non-profit organizations or projects.

The first round of disbursements, awarded last fall, went to the YSU Relay for Life (\$100), Read Across America (\$75) and Pink Tuesday (\$75). No new applications were received this spring, so the membership voted to award the full \$250 to the new food pantry established by the Student Government Association.

An application form has been created for APAS members only and the link is posted on the YSU APAS website. The next application deadline is Oct. 31 for fall semester; the spring semester deadline was March 31. Members whose project is not selected for funding by the committee may be reconsidered, but they must reapply.

## Relay for Life Team Raises \$1,080 to Battle Cancer

With cancer survivor and APAS member Lori Marshall, her friends and family leading the way, the YSU APAS Relay for Life team raised \$1,080 for cancer in April. The APAS team was awarded the "Rising Star Team Award" for exceeding \$1,000 in contributions.

A senior coordinator in YSU's Center for Student Progress, Lori was diagnosed with breast cancer on June 15, 2015, a date that she says will forever be etched in her memory. After a year of medical treatments that included a double mastectomy and breast reconstruction, she considers herself "one of the lucky ones."

Lori said she decided to participate in the Relay for Life because of her own experience, in memory of her mother, who also died of cancer when she was only 49, and to honor many other friends and family who have been touched by the disease. Lori's supporters provided items for a basket raffle and brought food, cookies and cotton candy to help raise funds the night of the relay. Her co-worker, Noreen Yazvac, donated two paintings that were raffled.

"I've participated in Relay for Life before, but this was my first time participating as a survivor and I really felt the love from my family and friends," Lori said. "High school friends that I hadn't seen for more than 30 years made donations. That was so amazing!"

YSU-APAS sponsored the relay event with a \$100 donation as a community service, and the APAS logo was included on the backs of the event t-shirts.



### Get a Flu Shot – It's Free!

Have you had a flu shot recently? YSU employees are now eligible to receive free flu shots at local pharmacies within our network, such as Walgreen's, Rite Aid and CVS. Just visit the pharmacy and show your insurance ID card to qualify for a flu shot with no copay. Previously, we were required to visit a physician or other network provider.
